

The Musicians

LARA DOWNES

An iconoclastic pianist whose artistry has been called "luscious, moody and dreamy" by *The New York Times*, Lara Downes takes inspiration where she finds it, going beyond labels like "classical" or "eclectic" to make music that is timeless and timely. Downes's forays into the broad landscape of American music have led to her chart-topping release, *America Again* (Sono Luminus, 2016), selected by NPR as one of the "10 Albums that Saved 2016." In recognition of this acclaimed album, she was a recipient of the 2017 Innovator of the Year award by the University of California, Davis.

Downes is also a laureate of the 2016 Sphinx Medal of Excellence award, for her leadership in expanding the reach of the arts as a performer, an entrepreneur, and a cultural visionary. She enjoys creative collaborations with a range of leading artists, from cellist Yo-Yo Ma to former US Poet Laureate Rita Dove. Downes's newest project, *Anniversaries for Lenny*, celebrates the American legacy of Leonard Bernstein on the 100th anniversary of his birth. When not on the road, Downes serves as artist-in-residence at the Mondavi Center for the Performing Arts, at the University of California, Davis, where she mentors the next generation of young musicians as director of the Mondavi Center National Young Artists Program.

KAORU WATANABE

Kaoru Watanabe, a Brooklyn-based composer and practitioner of the Japanese taiko drum and shinobue bamboo flutes, is known for artfully combining Japan's traditional ritual and theater music with complex compositional and improvisational elements of jazz and other global music. For close to a decade, Watanabe was a performing member and artistic director of Kodo—an iconic Japanese taiko performing arts group. Since leaving Kodo, Watanabe has collaborated with such luminaries as Japanese National Living Treasure Bandō Tamasaburō V, MacArthur Fellow Jason Moran, Sō Percussion, and film directors Martin Scorsese and Wes Anderson. He also was a featured artist on the Grammy Award–winning album *Sing Me Home*, by Yo-Yo Ma and the Silk Road Ensemble. Watanabe has performed his compositions at such prestigious venues as Carnegie Hall, the Lincoln Center, the Kennedy Center, the Whitney Museum, and Tokyo's Kabuki-za and has performed extensively across the Americas, Europe, Australia, and Asia. As an educator, Watanabe has taught courses at Princeton and Wesleyan Universities and was a faculty member at the Tanglewood Music Festival and at DePauw University for the Silk Road Project's Global Musician Workshop. He is an instructor for kaDON, an online resource presented by Japan's most prestigious taiko maker, Miyamoto Unosuke Shoten. His studio in Brooklyn hosts private lessons, rehearsals, weekly classes, intensive workshops, and professional-level training courses offered by both Watanabe and esteemed guest instructors from Japan.

SANDEEP DAS

Grammy-nominated Sandeep Das is considered one of the leading tabla players in the world today. One of the favorite disciples of the legendary tabla maestro, Pandit Kishan Maharaj of the Benaras Gharana, Das has carved out a niche for himself in the musical world. His concerts have taken him to major centers of music, including Carnegie Hall, the Lincoln Center, Royce Hall, Royal Albert Hall, the Hollywood Bowl, and the Petronas Tower Hall in Malaysia.

Das has composed for and performed internationally with Yo-Yo Ma and the Silk Road Ensemble since the group's founding in 2000. With the ensemble, he performed at the United Nations General Assembly Hall in 2008 and played the BBC Proms in 2004 and 2009. He is the only Indian artist to have performed for the opening ceremony of the Special Olympics Games in Shanghai.

The Project

The Canales Project, founded by Carla Dirlikov Canales, produces concert programs that explore issues of culture and identity through music and interaction with established artists who have lived and understand those issues. These concerts offer opportunities to hear music from many traditions, while giving the artists a chance to address their own experiences navigating questions of identity. The rising generation in the United States is called "the plurals" because so many of its members come from diverse backgrounds and speak multiple languages. The ability of many in this group to understand and operate in multiple cultures should not be seen as a burden but rather as an opportunity, a kind of super power this new generation possesses. Further, what sets this generation apart can also help bring its various cultures together, and with these ties, this new generation makes the journey from "the other" to the "all."

In this special performance, the Canales Project teams up with TEDxMidAtlantic to present three extraordinary artists who will share their perspective with TED-style commentary integrated into their performance. TEDxMidAtlantic celebrates the power of ideas to positively change the world and aims to build community by bringing together like-minded people who believe in this mission. In the spirit of ideas worth spreading, TEDx is a program of local, self-organized events that offer a TED-like experience with live speakers who spark deeper conversation.
